STUDENT PRESENTATION ON WHY UNACCOMPANIED STUDENTS MIGRATE

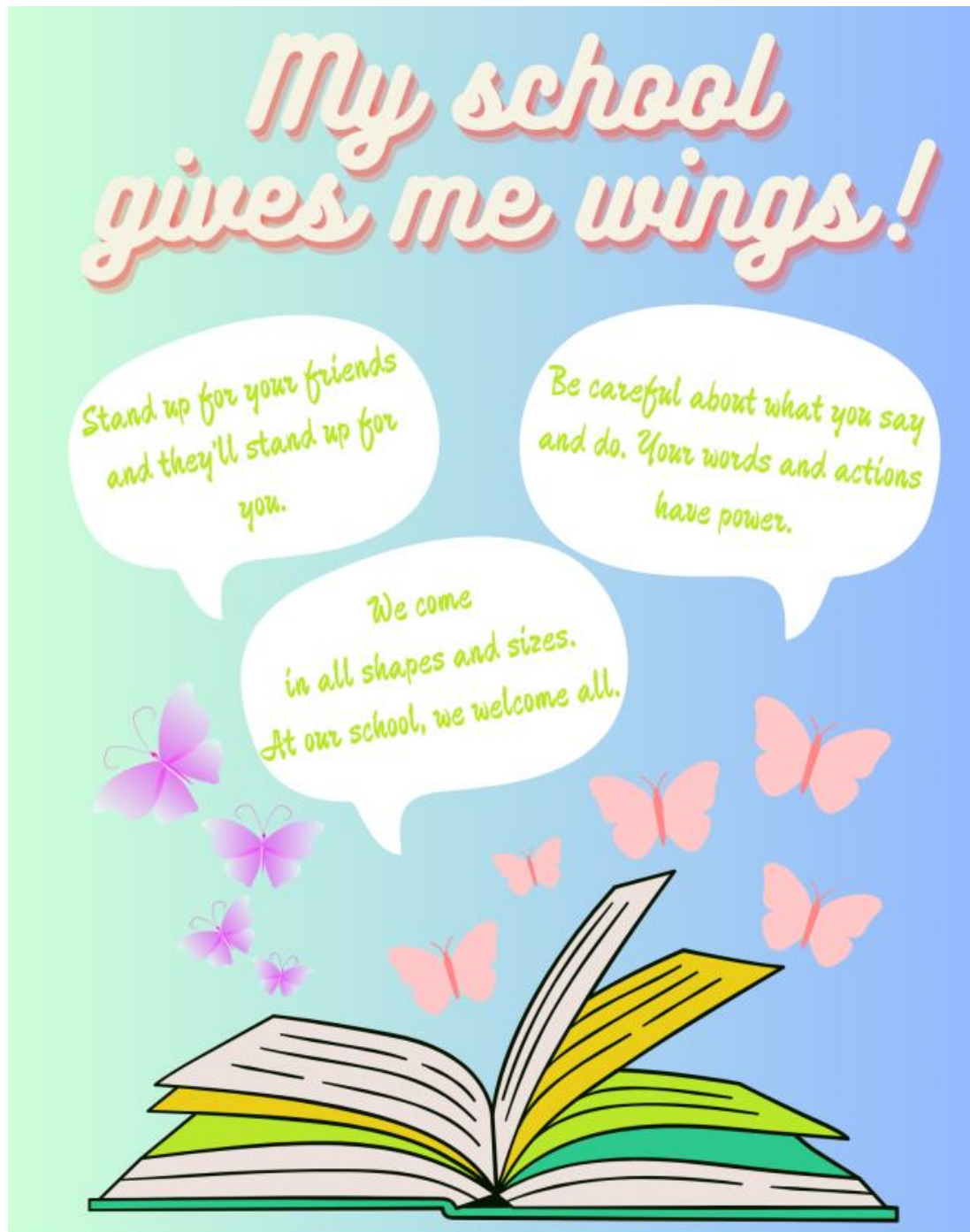
Our students did research on why unaccompanied students migrate so they could raise awareness about making them feel included.

Our students created a presentation on the induction week our school holds every year for the successful induction of our immigrant students.

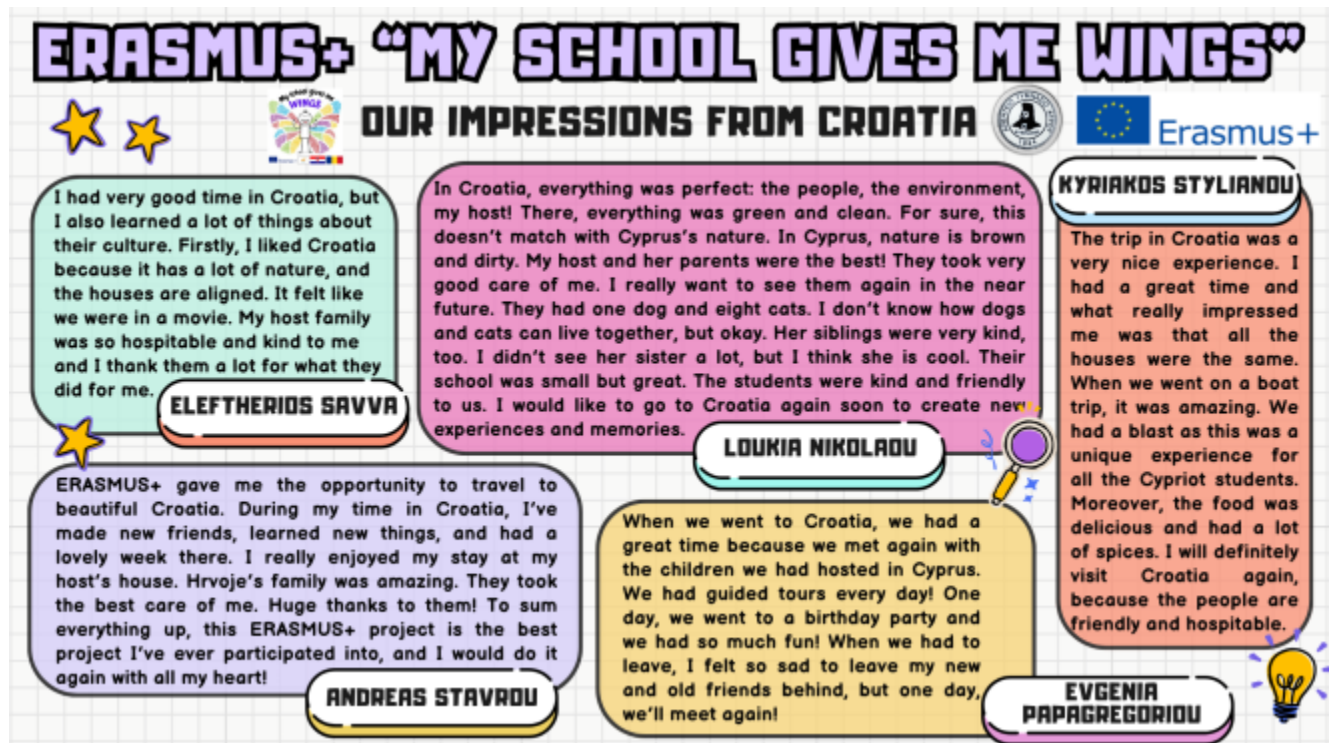
MY SCHOOL GIVES ME WINGS POSTER

THE HOLOCAUST

Why did they do the Holocaust?

Starting from the first world war, when nationalism was one of the biggest and strongest ideas across Europe. Germany, lost the first world war. Many Germans, including Adolf Hitler, found this very humiliating. All these people thought that the reason that they lost was the communist, socialist parties and Jews, believing that they betrayed the German Army instead of losing the battlefields. But, the strongest reason was Antisemitism. Antisemitism is the negative propaganda against Jewish people.

What is the Holocaust?

The Holocaust stands as one of the most horrific and tragic events in human history, a dark chapter by the systematic of millions of innocent people, specifically Jews by the Nazi government during world war II.

Statistics

In total six million people were murdered by the Nazi German regime. Between 800,000 and 1,000,000 Jews were murdered in ghettos, labor camps and concentration camps. Nazi murdered more than 2 million Jews in mass shooting operations in more than 1,500 cities, towns and villages across occupied eastern Europe. 250,000-300,000 people with disabilities, including at least 10,000 children living in institutions and care facilities were also murdered. Moreover, in total, upwards of 17 million people were systematically murdered by the Nazis, largely based on their ethnicity.

Remembrance Day

Holocaust Remembrance day is observed annually on January 27th, making the anniversary of the liberation of the Auschwitz-Birkenau concentration camp by Soviet troops in 1945. It serves as a reminder of the horrors of the Holocaust, the importance of honoring the memories of its victims and the necessity of preventing such atrocities from happening again.

How does the Holocaust affect Jewish people today?






Many Holocaust survivors experienced immense trauma, as they suffered during the genocide. This trauma can be passed down through generations, affecting the mental health and well-being of descendants of survivors. Synagogues, Jewish schools, community centers often face security threats, requiring increased protection measures to ensure the safety of the community members.
